Built in 1858, the house at 82 North Broadway in Nyack was the childhood home of painter Edward Hopper (1882-1967), where he lived for the first 28 years of his life. The view from his bedroom, the morning light, and the neighborhood were sources of inspiration and influenced his art. The family's house is now a small museum, which preserves Hopper's early works, artifacts, and memorabilia.

Besides the Hopper holdings, we can see "Kibitz & Nosh," an exhibition of photographs of New York City's vanished cafeterias by Marcia Bricker Halperin. The photos recall some of Hopper's most iconic oil paintings.

After the museum visit, we'll have time to relax in a local café before heading home.

Trip to Home Depot

The Horticulture Committee will sponsor a trip to the Home Depot for residents who wish to purchase plants to beautify their patios or for terrace gardeners. The date for this excursion is **Tuesday**, **May 23**. The van will make **two trips** - the first leaving from the main entrance at **9:45** am; the second will leave from the same place at **11:30** am.

If you wish to come along, please sign up with your name, contact information, and preferred time in the Trip Book at the main desk. Remember, the van only seats 12 so be sure to sign up early!

No Mow May

As you drive or walk around Kendal, you may notice the **No Mow May** signs at the southern end of the property. They celebrate Kendal's participation in this nationwide movement. In the United States, 40 million acres are planted with lawns—the single largest irrigated crop we grow! This represents a huge loss of habitat.

No Mow May supports allowing lawns to grow longer so that flowers embedded in them can bloom. These blooms provide early sources of nectar and pollen for hungry, newly emerging native bees.

Kendal was inspired to try out this idea by Linda M., who herself was inspired by the Village of Hastings Pollinator Pathway Project. With its guidance and the whole-hearted support of Bob Michael, Director of Facilities, Kendal can now be proud that it is a No Mow May site. Our participation in this national effort also perfectly dovetails with KoH's new designation as a Certified Wildlife Habitat.

If you prefer neatly trimmed lawns, be patient: mowing will return.

School Board Election

Polls are open for voting in-person on May 16 from 7:00 am to 9:00 pm in the cafeteria of Morse School. If you are voting by absentee ballot, it must be received by the school district before 5:00 pm on May 16 to be counted.

For the School Board, only two candidates, both incumbents, are running unopposed for two open seats.

On the reverse of the ballot, Proposition 1 seeks approval of the proposed 2023-2024 budget, while Prop 2 will establish a new "Child Safety Zone" in Tarrytown, with free school transportation provided.
